30's

Beginnings

Real Madrid's basketball section was born in **1931**. The exact date of its establishment is unknown, but it is safe to say the initiative was kick-started by an advertisement published on 8 March that year in newspaper ABC asking for players to form a basketball team.

Ángel Cabrera promoted the ad and is therefore considered to be the founder of the section. Later, Cabrera worked hard to create the Championship of Castilla in **1931**. Six teams participated and Real Madrid came in third. The following year saw the Whites finish as runners-up. The Club would have to wait one more year to win its first basketball title in the Championship final against the almighty Rayo, held at the Cuartel de la Montaña. It was the first accolade in the most brilliant track record ever seen in European basketball.

40's

Madridista supremacy in Castilla

As basketball took its baby steps in the country, Real Madrid's first venture in the sport was marked by their incredible rivalry with Rayo, who dominated throughout the country until the start of the Civil War. When the rival club disappeared in the **1941/42** season, its brilliant players Emilio and Pedro Alonso, their cousin Claudio and the great Vitórica joined Real Madrid. The Whites soon became the most important team in the region.

Real Madrid was by then a consolidated side that had experienced a rapid growth and aspired to take a decisive leap in quality that finally came with the arrival of the former Rayo players. Nevertheless, it seems this success would have arrived sooner or later without these men due to the Club Board's insistence to come up with a great team.

The Whites won the Championship of Castilla three years in a row (**1941/42, 1942/43, 1943/44**), but due to the emergence of important teams like SEU and America, they would have to wait another three years to win again. The arrival of men like Lozano, Caprotti, Philippine player Kaimo and the return of the Alonso brothers after a successful run with America allowed the Club to win the championship once more in the **1947/48** season and also the following year, with new arrivals such as Puerto Rican players Freddy Borrás and Juan Becerra. The team was unbeatable in the Region Centro, but they only managed to finish third in the Spanish Championship in **1943, 1948** and **1949**. Catalanian sides C.B. Hospitalet, C.D. Layetano, F.C. Barcelona and Juventud Badalona dominated the competition throughout the 1940s.

The team soon became successful in national competitions with the arrival of President Santiago Bernabéu, who signed its first foreign players and boosted the youth system.

50's

The legend begins

Real Madrid's victory in the **1949** Belgian Christmas Tournament against teams like Borletti Milan, Partizan Belgrade, Paris U.C. or Racing Club anticipated what was to come.

The 1950s began with yet another Championship of Castilla title. The signing of Willo Galíndez increased the team's chances in every competition, although they lost in the Copa del Generalísimo semifinals 33-32 against F.C. Barcelona, who eventually won the competition. Nevertheless, the team's ambition to win the Cup would soon be fulfilled.

Real Madrid's greatest basketball feat since the section's inception came in the **1950/51** campaign. After finishing third in the Championship of Castilla, the team focused on winning the Copa del Generalísimo, where they faced Grupo Cultural Covadonga and Liceo Francés in the quarterfinals and semis, respectively. The team eventually defeated Barcelona 47-36 in the San Sebastián final. Raimundo Saporta took over the section the following year and signed José Garrido and Domingo Bárcenas, who helped the team win the Cup again and initiated an extremely successful run that also gave the Club the National League title and a European Cup (the latter two were new competitions, established in **1956/57** and **1957/58**, respectively).

After winning the Copa Latina in **1953** and the Spanish Championships of **1954** and **1956**, Real Madrid faced their greatest challenge yet: the National League, a competition founded by Raimundo Saporta. F.C. Barcelona, Orillo Verde Sabadell, C.B. Aismalíbar, Juventud Badalona and Estudiantes were the other teams to participate besides the Whites, who won the title thanks to new players like Hernández, Codina, Imedio, the Martínez brothers and Trujillano.

The team and Barcelona drew with 17 points each, but the Whites won thanks to having a superior basket-average. Real Madrid won two titles in one season for the first time that year, also taking the Copa Aismalíbar title. The legend was being born and the team was forging a reputation of being unbeatable.

The European Cup is born

Real Madrid needed new challenges due to its superiority in the national competitions. It had faced foreign teams regularly in the **1940s**, winning its first international title (the Copa Latina) in **1953**. Despite all this, by the mid-**1950s** there still wasn't a European competition to pit all the league champions in the Continent against each other.

Raimundo Saporta's vision proved to be decisive once again, kick-starting the greatest basketball championship Europe had ever seen in **1957**: the European Cup. The team reached the semifinals in their championship debut after defeating sides such as F.C. Barreirense and Royal IV. They didn't reach the final because the Government didn't allow the team to travel to the USSR to face ASK Riga, as the country was considered an enemy state at the time. The Soviets won the title against Akademik Sofia. The disappointment of not being able to play in Russia was somewhat forgotten thanks to winning the league title again that year.

Ferrándiz arrives

The **1958/59** campaign was a bitter disappointment for a team that was used to winning all the time. Real Madrid came in second in the league and were eliminated in the Last 16 of the European Cup by Étoile Charleville. They also lost against Barcelona in the semifinals of the Copa del Generalísimo.

The Club believed the team should aspire to win every title it played for and an unsuccessful season forced the entity to take steps towards coming up with a leading team in Europe. The most important change was the signing of coach Pedro Ferrándiz, who was at the helm of the team in the greatest run of its history. He renewed the squad with men like Sevillano, Laso, Parra and Nadal, and US players like Travis Richard Montgomery. Real Madrid won the league and the Copa del Generalísimo in the **1959/60** season, starting the **1960s** with chances of becoming a legendary side. This they achieved during the Triumvirate of Santiago Bernabéu, Raimundo Saporta and Pedro Ferrándiz.

60's

First golden era

The **1960s** was one of the most brilliant decades in the history of the Club's Basketball Section because it won titles in excess, one of them being the Club's first European Cup.

The team made great strides to achieve its goal of winning the competition in the **1960/61** campaign with the signing of legendary players Emiliano Rodríguez and Lolo Sáinz.

They reached the European Cup semifinals after winning the league and the Copa del Generalísimo. The opponent was ASK Riga once again, but this time, thanks to Saporta's diplomacy, Real Madrid managed to overcome all the political barriers that stood in their way thanks to an agreement that even got FIBA involved. It was agreed that both games would take place in neutral territory to both teams and the Soviets were compensated with \$1,000.

Real Madrid acted as local side in the first game held in Paris. The return leg took place at the other side of the Iron Curtain, in Prague. ASK won 75-78 in France and 66-45 in Czechoslovakia, snatching yet another ticket to the final from the Whites.

Real Madrid failed to win the title, but the great progress the team had made was obvious to all. They managed to reach the European Cup final the following year and they also won the league and the Copa del Generalísimo once more. The final was held in Geneva and, despite a brilliant performance, the Whites lost 90-83 against Dynamo Tbilisi. Real Madrid had become the first side from Western Europe to reach a final in the championship, earning the admiration of the entire Continent for being the only side capable of putting up a strong fight against Soviet teams like ASK Riga and Dynamo, who ruled over the championship.

The Whites were pitted against a Soviet side, TSKA Moscow, yet again in the **1962/63** campaign. Despite winning the Madrid clash 86-69, the Madridistas lost 91-74 in Moscow and 99-80 in the tiebreak fixture.

Clifford Luyk and Robert Burgess, who eventually became basketball legends in their own right, made their debut that year.

First European Cup

Real Madrid were given another chance to win the European Cup by winning the **1962/63** league title. The team had no worthy adversary in Spain, finding tough competition only in the Continental championship. The Club's greatest merit during those years was an insatiable hunger for titles that ensured the team wouldn't relax in the National League.

The key to the Whites' success in the seventh edition of the European Cup was their perseverance, quality and the experience gained against the Eastern European colossi. Real Madrid were the first team to put an end to the overwhelming rule of teams from beyond the Iron Curtain thanks to their **1964** victory over Spartak Brno. It was also a national success, since the prestige of Spain in sports was then reduced to the triumph of Di Stéfano's Real Madrid football side and Spain's victory in the 1964 football European Championship after defeating the USSR 2-1 at the Santiago Bernabéu Stadium.

Real Madrid defeated Celtic Belfast and Aachen easily in the Round of 32 and Last 16, respectively. They then won against Legia Warsaw in the quarterfinals to face Simmenthal Milan in the semis, a complicated team that gave some trouble to the Madridistas. They lost 82-77 in Italy, but came back from the initial defeat with an outstanding 101-78 in Fiesta Alegre.

Fourteen thousand fans went to see the first clash of the final in Brno on 27 April. Real Madrid had a hard time avoiding being thrashed by the locals. Sevillano, Sáinz and Descartín were eliminated with five fouls each and the team lost 110-99. Joaquín Hernández's brilliant performance surely saved the Madridistas from a debacle.

Fiesta Alegre was the venue for the 10 May return leg. Fans packed the pavilion to help the team come back from an initial 11-point defeat. The Czech's resistance and tenacity allowed them to stand firm in the first 25 minutes, but no longer. A sense of elation took hold of the Madridistas and their fans, and the team eventually won 84-64 due to an amazing performance. The long-awaited European Cup triumph was now a reality for Real Madrid.

Kings of Europe

The absence of Soviet teams in the competition that year due to sporting reasons made some people consider Real Madrid's success as unimportant, but the following year, the team had the chance to prove it hadn't won the title by chance.

Pedro Ferrándiz replaced Joaquín Hernández as coach in a complicated year due to the latter's grave illness that took his life on 20 January, **1965**. The squad managed to shake off such a hard blow and reached the final yet again by defeating tough sides like Helsinki Kisa-Tovarit, Villeurbanne and Radivoj Korac's OKK Belgrade. ▶

They were pitted against their **1963** opponent, TSKA Moscow, who won in the 8 April clash in Russia by only seven points (88–81). This was an excellent result for the Whites, and it was pulled off thanks to the great efforts of Luyk (28 points), Burgess and Emiliano.

Real Madrid gave their opponent no quarter during the Frontón Vistalegre clash five days later, defeating them 76–62 and confirming their European supremacy with a second European Cup title.

It was a spectacular season for the Whites, who also won the league and the Copa del Generalísimo.

New pavilion, new trophy

Important changes were made for the **1965/66** campaign. Pedro Ferrándiz returned to the Sports Directorship of the Club and prestigious French coach Robert Busnel was signed. The Real Madrid Sports Pavilion was inaugurated at the old Real Madrid City, which meant the team would never play in the legendary Fiesta Alegre Pavilion again.

To commemorate this event, the Club organized a tournament named Intercontinental Cup–Philips Trophy, which soon became the traditional Christmas Tournament. Italian side Ignis Varese won the first edition of the competition.

The Whites won the league and the Cup again, failing to win their third consecutive European Cup title due to losing in the quarterfinals.

Real Madrid: sign of the times

With Ferrándiz at the helm of the team again, Real Madrid became as successful in Europe as in previous campaigns. The Madridistas came through in the European Cup quarterfinals league and felt great pressure in the Madrid playoffs due to having lost against an amazing Joventut side just a few days back. A victory in the European championship was therefore the only ticket the team could hope for to play in the competition again the following season.

Current European champs Simmenthal Milan, Olimpia Ljubljana, Slavia Prague and Real Madrid were the four contenders for the title. The Whites faced the Slovenian's in the semis, winning 88–86, while the Italians defeated the Czech's 103–97.

The 1 April **1967** final was a sports event of great importance in Spain and was even televised live for the entire country to watch. Real Madrid won thanks to Emiliano's brilliant 29 points and to a great performance by Aiken. The final score was 91–83.

The Club signed the then unknown Wayne Brabender at the start of the **1967/68** season. The team recovered its Spanish throne by winning the league title and it also won the European Cup again against Spartak Brno (98–95). This new prowess turned Real Madrid into the most successful team in Europe; they had already surpassed ASK Riga's three Continental titles.

An amazing track record seemed to indicate the Whites knew no limits. The team aspired to win every title again the following year with the promotion of youth system players Rafael Rullán and Carmelo Cabrera, and the signing of famous men like point-guard Vicente Ramos. But they only won the league title, after losing to Juventud by one point in the Cup (82–81) and to TSKA Moscow in Europe.

Real Madrid succumbed in Barcelona to the Soviets after two overtimes and by failing to capitalize on the two chances they had to sentence the clash. Aiken missed a shot inches away from the iron with no opposition in added time. Kapranov, Sergei Belov and, particularly, Andreiev had a great game and tipped the scales towards the Russian team.

Real Madrid had reached a peak and every team in Spain and Europe had looked for ways to end their supremacy.

70's

Overwhelming supremacy in Spain

The **1970s** saw how European supremacy was held for several years by a team from the small Italian town of Varese. Their demolishing and dynamic game gave the Italians three consecutive European titles between **1970** and **1973**.

Real Madrid lost to them in the semifinals of the **1969/70** and **1970/71** seasons. They lost in the semis again in **1971/72** against Yugoslavian side Jugoplastica Split, and failed to reach further than the quarterfinals league the following year.

Their failure to recover the European throne was compensated by spectacular performances in Spain, winning the league and the Cup every year between **1970** and **1973**.

White apotheosis

Real Madrid could wait no longer and was forced to make some painful changes in order to become a strong contender in the Continent and stand up to Varese.

Emiliano, who embodied the greatness of the Club, retired in June **1973**. Ferrándiz looked to the States again to sign a player capable of taking roots in Madrid. The chosen man was Walter Szczerbiak, American small forward of Balkan origins with a lethal shot and extraordinary talent in defense.

Szczerbiak had an incredible run in the **1973/74** season and helped Real Madrid destroy Barcelona in the first league clash that year thanks to netting 46 points (125–65).

The team seemed ready to fight for the European Cup, especially after they won the league by being superior in every game save for a drawn clash. They reached the final with the almighty Varese quite easily by defeating Olympique Freiburg, USC Heidelberg, Akademik Sofia, Radnicki Belgrade, UBSC Vienna and Berck.

The clash was very even and the Whites didn't tip the scales in their favor until the very final minutes, when the very young point guard Juan Antonio Corbalán

(who came in after Carmelo Cabrera had been eliminated with five fouls) took the reins of the team. The final 84-82 score in favor of Real Madrid says it all.

One of the most spectacular rivalries in the history of European basketball took a new dimension in the mid-**1970s** with impressive duels between men such as Rullán, Meneghin, Luyk, Morse, Corbalán, Visón, Brabender and Szczerbiak that helped the sport grow stronger throughout the world.

The Madridistas went on to win the Copa del Generalísimo against Juventud a few days later, therefore taking three titles in one season for the second time in their history.

Duel for the european crown

Real Madrid and Varese faced each other in four finals throughout the **1970s (1974, 1975, 1976 & 1978)**, winning two each. Real Madrid took the European Cup title home in **1974** and **1978** and lost in **1975** and **1976**. Both clubs dominated the basketball scene in their respective countries.

Ferrándiz decided to replace himself as coach with Lolo Sáinz, whom he regarded as his best 'student'. The team didn't suffer from the change and went on to win the league title again in **1976** and **1977**, as well as the Cup the latter year.

The new coach's greatest challenge to that point was to reach the third consecutive European Cup final against Varese. The players were anxious to avenge themselves from their defeat the previous year, which had prevented Ferrándiz to say his farewell to the team with yet another brilliant accolade. But excellent performances by Morse and Meneghin thwarted Sáinz's chances of winning the European title in his first season at the helm of the team.

The squad got over the disappointment of losing in the Geneva final by winning its first Intercontinental Cup in Buenos Aires on 5 October **1976** against Amazonas Franca, Obras Sanitarias, Missouri University, Asfa Dakar and Mobilgiri Varese.

Sáinz won his first European Cup title in the **1977/78** season, the same year in which Joventut put an end to Real Madrid's ten-year reign in the Spanish league.

The Madridistas had put all their hopes on the Continental title and performed brilliantly in the quarterfinals thanks in part to the excellent job done by young players like Fernando Romay and Juan Manuel López Iturriaga. They were superior to Figueirense, Bayer Leverkusen and Dudelange. They faced Alvik Stockholm, Jugoplastika Split, Maccabi Tel Aviv, Molbilgiri Varese and Villeurbanne in the semis, earning seven victories and only three defeats. The Whites and Varese faced off again in the final, both hoping to establish a new record with a sixth European Cup title. Real Madrid eventually won and brought two-year reign of the Italians to an end.

Varese played very well, but they were powerless to prevent Real Madrid's domination from the start through Szczerbiak, Brabender, Coughran, Cabrera

and Rullán. The final 75–67 score was fair to an ambitious team on which every player had a higher regard for collective goals than for individual objectives.

This was the last title the basketball team was able to offer to legendary President Santiago Bernabéu, who sadly died on 2 June **1978**.

Significant retirements

Two Real Madrid legends, Clifford Luyk and Vicente Ramos, retired prior to the start of the **1978/79** campaign, leaving an amazing and hard-to-equal track record behind them.

It wasn't easy, but the Whites managed to come back from such losses with reinforcements like Meister, Beirán, Querejeta and Gaztañaga.

Winning the Intercontinental Cup proved the strength of the new squad, which also won the league title against formidable opponents like Barcelona and Joventut.

Real Madrid came close to qualifying for the European Cup final again, but unfortunately, three missed free throws against Varese gave the Italians the victory in the semis (83-82) and therefore a ticket to their tenth consecutive final.

80's

Seven-time European champs

New changes were made in the **1979/80** season, including the departure of extraordinary players like Cristóbal Rodríguez and Carmelo Cabrera. This was compensated by the promotion to the first team of Fernando Romay and José Luis Llorente. In order to use the team's strongest assets in the European Cup, Lolo Sáinz decided to play Szczerbiak only in said competition.

This decision was very controversial at first, but it worked. The Club won yet another league title after an exciting mano a mano with Barcelona and Estudiantes, who faltered in their latter games. Real Madrid even put an end to Barcelona's incredible run of standing undefeated at home for ten years by winning in the northern city 85-84 in the fifth game of the campaign.

But the most important challenge for the team was to try to win another European Cup title. The Whites played solidly in memorable clashes with Sinudyne Bologna, Partizan Belgrade, Bosnia Sarajevo, Den Bosch and Maccabi Tel Aviv, facing the latter again in the 23 March **1980** final in Berlin.

The Israelites were clear favorites. They lost by only one point in the Madrid semifinals clash (97-96) and won impressively in Tel Aviv 110–100.

Their favoritism spurred the Whites to win in Germany. They were winning 48-40 by half time and an excellent run in the opening minutes of the second part increased their lead to 11 points. The Israelites reacted in desperation and

managed to cut distances to only three points, but Real Madrid stood firm and, thanks to a stellar Rullán, managed to win their seventh European Cup title.

Changes in the new decade

Winning their seventh European title was the best way for the players to start the 1980s, which saw many changes in basketball.

The most important of these was the creation of the Association of Basketball Clubs (ACB) in the **1982/83** campaign, which subsequently created the ACB League, a revamping of the national competition with the introduction of a playoffs system both to win the championship and to avoid relegation.

Following great controversy, teams were allowed to have two foreigners play for them in the league. The 6.25 line (and with it three-pointers) was introduced, as well as the 1+1 formula.

Basketball exploded in Spain during the **1980s** thanks to the national team's brilliant performances. After playing in the Moscow Olympics, the **1982** World Championship and winning a silver medal in the Nantes **1983** European Championship, the Spaniards, coached by Antonio Díaz Miguel, managed to win an historic Olympic Silver Medal in Los Angeles **1984**. This medal kick-started a basketball craze in the country and many people started to learn what the sport was all about.

Intercontinental Cup triumph

Barcelona won the league and the Cup in the **1980/81** campaign. Real Madrid didn't reach past the semifinals in the European Cup, but they managed to win the Intercontinental Cup, which was then known as the International Cup. The competition took place between 25 June and 5 July **1981** and Madrid won after defeating Clemson University, First of August, Cuaiquerías, Sirio, Ferrocarril Oeste, Francana and Santa Kilda.

Two of the best players in the tournament were Madridistas Mirza Delibasic (who had been signed the previous spring) and a very young Fernando Martín (who made his official debut against Santa Kilda, scoring 50 points).

The League becomes tighter

Real Madrid won the league in the 1981/82 season with a two-point cushion over Barcelona, who took revenge in the Badajoz Copa del Rey final by defeating the Whites 110-108 in a controversial game, during which the Madridistas were booked with 64 personal fouls.

The team reached the European Cup Winners' Cup final in Brussels without much effort, but Alexander Petrovic's Cibona waited for them there and unfortunately won 96-95 in added time.

In Spain, Real Madrid were no longer alone in the fight for titles. Barcelona and Joventut were strong opponents capable of snatching a trophy from the Whites. ►

The Madridistas lost the league in a tiebreak game with Barcelona held in Oviedo; both teams had ended the season with 50 points. The Madridistas didn't go past the semi-finals in the European Cup. Because of Barcelona's refusal to negotiate the television rights of the sport, Real Madrid refused to face the Catalan team in the northern city, therefore forfeiting their chances in the championship.

Dawning of a new era: the ACB League

The National League underwent a radical change with the creation of the Association of Basketball Clubs (ACB) in March of 1983. That year saw the introduction of the playoffs system in the championship.

Real Madrid needed to have a successful season and won the first ACB League title partly thanks to the signings of Wayne Robinson and Brian Jackson, and the promotion of academy players Antonio Martín and Juan Orenga.

The Madridistas defeated eternal foe Barcelona in the playoff finals; the Catalans refused to play the third game when the Competition Committee refused to punish Juan Manuel López Iturriaga after an incident he was involved in with Barcelona center Davis in the second game. The final score was therefore 2-1 for the Whites.

Real Madrid became the first Spanish team ever to win a European Cup Winners' Cup that season. They defeated Scavolini and Drazen Petrovic's Cibona Zagreb on their way to the final, where they faced Dino Meneghin's and Mike D'Antoni's Simac Olimpia Milan, whom they defeated 81-80.

It was a glorious year both for Real Madrid and the Spanish national team, who won the silver medal in the **1984** L.A. Olympic Games (it was the team's greatest feat until it won the gold medal in the 2006 World Championship of Japan). Real Madrid's Juan Antonio Corbalán, Fernando Martín, Juan Manuel López Iturriaga, Fernando Romay and José Manuel Beirán all played in L.A.

Cibona thwarts chances for a three-title run

Both Spain and Real Madrid were en-vogue in **1984**. The Whites' pavilion was packed for every clash and the Club was extremely demanding with itself. The **1984/85** campaign saw the team strengthening itself with Alfonso del Corral and Soviet national team star Chechu Biriukov, who had recently obtained the Spanish nationality due to having a Spanish mother.

The Whites finished the regular season at the top of the table and reached the playoffs final by defeating Estudiantes 2-1 and Licor 43 2-0. Joventut made things hard for the team in the finals, winning the first game 111-86, but succumbed to Real Madrid's superiority in the last two encounters.

Both sides faced each other again in the Copa del Rey final. Despite being extremely motivated, Joventut were powerless against the Madridistas, who won 90-76, therefore taking their first Copa del Rey title in eight years.

Despite problems against Cibona and Maccabi in the European Cup's semifinals, the team went on to face the former side in the 3 April Athens final.

Drazen Petrovic's spectacular performance (36 points), as well as Alexander and Zoran Cutura's great game, proved too much for Real Madrid, who couldn't count on Fernando Martín and Juan Antonio Corbalán due to injuries. They never really got into the game and lost 87-78.

The Club won the ACB and the Copa del Rey again in 1986, but was eliminated in the semifinals of the European Cup.

Fernando Martín: first Spaniard in the NBA

Fernando Martín left for the world's best basketball league, the NBA, at the end of the season, becoming the first Spaniard to join the American competition. He signed for Portland Trail Blazers, where he stayed one year, playing in 24 games, scoring 22 points and grabbing 28 rebounds. His brother Antonio also left the Club to join Pepperdine University, but he never managed to play any games because someone informed the deans he had played as a professional at Real Madrid, which goes against the regulations of the NCAA.

Real Madrid was practically dismantled by these departures and those of Wayne Robinson and Linton Townes, who were replaced by center Brad Branson and L.A. Lakers small forward Larry Spriggs.

Former Santa Coloma small forward Pep Cargol completed the roster. Madrid's Palacio de los Deportes became the team's official pavilion this year due to its increase in seats (12,500).

The Whites ended the season as runners-up in the ACB League and the Euroleague. They reached the quarterfinals in the Copa del Rey.

Three prodigal sons return

The sports directorship of the Club began working on coming up with a very competitive roster, capable of bringing success back to the team.

The return of Antonio Martín and José Luis Llorente was a significant improvement in the point guard and center positions. Excellent power forward Wendell Alexis, who came from Forum Valladolid, replaced Larry Spriggs. On the other hand, Rafa Rullán, a banner of Madridismo, left the Club after 18 years of service.

Fernando Martín was initially slated to stay in Portland one more year, but negotiations to extend his contract proved unsuccessful and the player decided to return to Spain, where Real Madrid waited with arms wide open.

He instantly negotiated his contract extension with the Club and, despite the fact that the roster was already complete, coach Lolo Sáinz made room for one of the most important European centers.

Bad luck thwarted the team's chances in crucial moments during the campaign. The Whites reached the Copa del Rey final after defeating CAI Zaragoza and Joventut, but lost against Barcelona due to Nacho Solozábal's last-second three-pointer.

The Madridistas came in second in the ACB's regular season with an impressive run of 25 victories and only three defeats. The team's performances had been brilliant and the fans believed in its chances to win the title. Real Madrid defeated Taugrés 2-1 in a complicated quarterfinal series, but destroyed CAI 3-0 in the semis. Barcelona once again waited in the final.

Lolo Sáinz's boys came close to winning the first game in Barcelona, but eventually lost 75-73. Their only chance was to win the two clashes in Madrid to force a fifth game to take place. Things went according to plan and the final encounter (held in Barcelona due to Barça's home advantage) was a very tight affair until Fernando Martín was injured. Real Madrid suffered from the loss and eventually lost 93-79.

The team's only title in the **1987/88** season was the Korac Cup, where they dominated from start to finish, defeating Cibona in the two-game final. The Madrid clash finished with an impressive 102-89 for the Whites, which rendered Cibona's return 94-93 result useless despite Petrovic's incredible performance (44 points). The Korac Cup was the only European title the Club hadn't won up to that time.

Petrovic: the genius from Sibenik

Drazen Petrovic, who had been Cibona's star in many clashes with the Whites, eventually joined Real Madrid in the **1988/89** campaign. He had actually been signed in **1986**, but the Yugoslavian Basketball Association had prevented his leaving the country until after the **1988** Seoul Olympics.

Real Madrid had therefore signed their most dangerous opponent, a marvelous player who was unstoppable in one-on-ones and infallible in his outer-perimeter shots. There was no antidote for Petrovic.

His signing somewhat filled the gap left by the departure of José Antonio Corbalán and Juan Manuel López Iturriaga; the latter never shared a dressing room with his greatest nemesis.

The Croatian player showcased his talent from the very start of the season. He made his first impressive mark in October **1988** during the final of the II McDonalds Open, where the team faced NBA runners-up Boston Celtics. Petrovic scored 22 points and showed his future American teammates what he was capable of.

The Whites performed sensationally well against a side comprising legendary players like Larry Bird, Danny Ainge, Kevin McHale and Robert Parish.

Real Madrid were better in each game. The players gradually adapted to the team better and upped the pace a bit in each clash. The 53rd edition of the

Copa del Rey proved those who believed the Whites to be the favorite side were right. They defeated Magia Huesca and RAM Joventut in the quarterfinals and semis, respectively, to go on to win against Barcelona in the final. Their next big challenge would be the European Cup Winners' Cup.

Memorable game

Qualifying as group leaders, the Whites got rid of Cibona Zagreb in the semifinals, with Petrovic showing no mercy to his former teammates.

The Peace and Friendship Palace of Athens was designed to host the final between Real Madrid and Snaidero Caseta, club which had recently signed extraordinary players like Óscar Schmidt Becerra, Esposito, Dell'Angello and Gentile.

The final looked to be promising because it was set to pit the two best European teams against each other, but no one expected it to become one of the best-ever games in European basketball history.

Petrovic's 62 points perfectly described the spectacle witnessed by basketball fans that night in Athens. Schmidt netted 44 points and Gentile another 34, adding further greatness to a clash that had to be decided in added time. The Italian resistance was incredible, but Caserta were powerless against Petrovic, whose talent allowed him to pull off his best performance as a Madridista that evening. Biriukov (20 points), Rogers (14) and Fernando Martín (11) also stood out.

Scandal at The Palau

Real Madrid only needed the league title to add to their incredible run that year. After finishing second in the regular season, Real Madrid enjoyed having the home advantage in the playoff quarterfinals against Taugrés (whom they defeated 2-0), and won 3-1 against Joventut in the semis.

Yet again, Barcelona was their final opponent. The Catalan side had Epi, Solozábal and Audi Norris in its ranks and held the home advantage. The clash was expected to be extremely tight.

Real Madrid lost the first game 94-69, but performed brilliantly in the second encounter and drew the series by winning 88-81. They nevertheless lost the third game 100-86 and Barcelona had them against the ropes.

Lolo Sáinz's boys knew how much was at stake for them and played to the limit. Another exhibition by Petrovic allowed the Whites to force the series to go into a fifth clash, which would take place at the Palau.

The final was going according to what fans had hoped for; two teams in excellent form were starring in an extremely tight fight for the league title. The in-the-paint duels between Fernando Martín and Audi Norris, the brilliance of Petrovic, Epi's impossible shots, and the brilliant playmaking skills of José Luis Llorente and Nacho

Solozábal kept the entire nation glued to the TV screen. But, unfortunately, the officiating crew took center stage in the fifth clash.

Real Madrid's hopes to win the league title vanished when they were penalized with 41 personal fouls, while their opponent were only booked with 19. This forced the team to play the final minutes of the game with four men and, therefore, left them with no chances to fight for the title.

Tough times

The turning point was Fernando Martín's deadly car accident on 3 December **1989**; the team simply couldn't recover from such a hard blow during the remainder of the season. Fernando wasn't just a great player, but a leader in the dressing room. President Ramón Mendoza saw it this way and decided the team should no longer have a number '10' shirt in memory of Fernando. No one since has worn that number.

Real Madrid won no titles in the **1989/90** and **1990/91** campaigns. Tragedy struck again when Ignacio Pinedo, who had replaced coach Wayne Brabender halfway through the season, died of a heart attack during the Korac Cup final against Clear Cantú. The Whites lost the encounter.

90's

Third Cup Winners' Cup

The team returned to the path of success in the **1991/92** campaign. George Karl was Real Madrid's coach for a second consecutive season. Mark Simpson and Rickie Brown replaced Carl Herrera and Stanley Roberts, two brilliant players who never quite adapted to the squad. Estudiantes point guard and ACB rising star José Miguel Antúnez also joined the team. All in all, there was an optimistic atmosphere at the Club.

But Karl's revolutionary methods didn't prove too fruitful. The American eventually gave in to pressure and tendered his resignation before 1991 was over. Clifford Luyk grabbed the reins and the team's improvement was spectacular.

The Whites didn't manage to go through to the semis in the Copa del Rey (held in Granada that year), but they qualified brilliantly for the European Cup Winners' Cup final, which took place at Nantes' Beaulieu Pavilion, where Real Madrid were set to face Fassoulas' and Prelevic's PAOK, a tough and quality opponent.

The Madridistas' good performance in the first half of the clash anticipated an easy victory; Mark Simpson was destroying the Greeks from outside the perimeter while Antonio Martín, Fernando Romay and Ricky Brown dominated in the key.

The Whites had a 15-point cushion by half time, but PAOK hadn't said their last quite yet. An amazing Prelevic managed to cut distances short and eventually drew the clash with seconds to go to the final buzzer. Mark Simpson forced a personal foul and had a 1+1 that gave him the chance of netting the winning point provided he scored from his first free throw, but he didn't. Fassoulas grabbed the rebound and

passed the ball to his team's point guard. Luckily, an amazing Ricky Brown intercepted the ball, shot on target and scored two decisive points in the last second. This way, the Madridistas won their third European Cup Winners' Cup heroically and therefore put an end to the dreadful run of previous years.

The team got rid of Granollers in the ACB playoff Last 16 (2-0), Barcelona in the quarterfinals (2-0) and Taugrés in semis (3-2). Joventut, now coached by Lolo Sáinz, waited in the finals.

The series was tight and Madrid managed to force it going into a fifth game thanks to an extraordinary victory in the fourth that had greatly diminished the team's strength -Antonio Martín and Mark Simpson were injured-. Unable to overcome these losses, the Whites lost 85-72 in Badalona. The players had fought to the end, recovering their excellent style and the fervent support of the fans. Clifford Luyk had pulled off a miracle. Real Madrid had gone back to being a competitive side, which was bad news for its opponents.

Arvydas Sabonis signs for Real Madrid

After several months of negotiating, Ramón Mendoza and Mariano Jaquotot signed Lithuanian center Arvydas Sabonis, who came from Forum Valladolid and was the best center in the Continent and one of the best in the World. An injury on his Achilles tendon somewhat truncated his impressive rise, but even when suffering from this he had no rival.

With a height of 2.21 meters, Sabonis grabbed many rebounds, scored countless points from under the iron and was also capable of dribbling and passing the ball like a point guard, of shooting three-pointers like a power forward and of penetrating the key from outside the perimeter. His knowledge of the game and his amazing technique allowed him to triumph in all sorts of situations.

Under his leadership, Real Madrid aspired to win every title in the **1992/93** season and defeated Joventut in the La Coruña Copa del Rey final 74-71. Sabonis scored 25 points, helping the Whites win their 20th Cup title (their last to this day).

Excellent performances & new League title

The team reached the playoff quarterfinals of the European League (which had replaced the European Cup) without much trouble. Their last opponent on the way to the Athens Final Four was Knorr Bologna, whom they defeated 2-0.

Real Madrid were favorites to win the championship; fans and journalists alike unanimously considered them to be superior to Limoges, PAOK and Benetton.

They faced Limoges (coached by Bozidar Maljkovic) in the semifinals. The French defeated Madrid thanks to their impenetrable defense and Michael Young's stellar performance, scoring points in key moments of the clash.

But this hard blow wasn't something they couldn't recover from. The Madridistas focused all their efforts on the ACB league, determined to take the league

title for the first time in seven years. Elosúa León, Estudiantes and Joventut were their opponents in the playoffs. It wasn't an easy ride for Real Madrid; both the semis and the final series had to be decided in a fifth encounter, but they overcame adversity. Winning the title was a just reward for dominating the championship from start to finish.

Second consecutive League title

The Club started to work on coming up with a squad that would put the team back on the European throne. Rimas Kurtinaitis, academy player Juan Ignacio Romero and Joe Arlauckas, and extraordinary power forward who had previously played for TAU Vitoria, replaced Simpson, Brown and the legendary Fernando Romay.

The Whites lost in the Copa del Rey semifinals to Barcelona (81-75) and couldn't reach further than the quarterfinals in the European competition after losing 2-0 against Joventut. This unexpected defeat forced the team to forfeit its main goal of the season.

The league title was all the team could aspire to win and they worked hard to get it. They didn't falter in the Last 16 against DYC Lugo, nor in the quarterfinals with TDK Manresa (2-1).

Once again, Estudiantes waited for them in the semis, but the Whites were far superior and won 3-1. Barcelona were powerless in the final against the impressive Sabonis–Arlauckas–Kurtinaitis threesome and lost 3-0.

Glory attained in Zaragoza

Zeljko Obradovic replaced Luyck to increase the teams chances of winning the European title, as he had done with Partizan Belgrade and Joventut Badalona in **1992** and **1994**, respectively.

The Whites' performances in Europe were very good. They qualified easily for the playoff quarterfinals of the Euroleague by finishing second in the Last 16. Determined to be in the Zaragoza Final Four, Real Madrid pulled rank and defeated Cibona Zagreb 2-0.

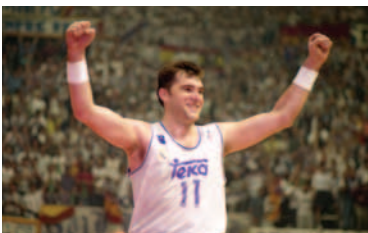
The Madridistas had to face their demons in Zaragoza, as they were set to face Michael Young's and Richard Dacoury's Limoges (who deprived them of winning the title in **1993**) in the semifinals. Obradovic's boys kept them in check with their defensive game and scored with certain ease in offence.

The final score to a perfect game was 62–49, ten years after their last final and 15 since their last European Cup title. Real Madrid now had a great chance to relive former glories.

Olympiacos was the team to beat. The Greeks had a brilliant squad with men such as Panaiotis Fassoulas, Giorgios Sigalas, Alexander Volkov, Dragan Tarlac and Eddie Johnson. Aware of the importance and difficulty of the encounter, the Whites were determined to destroy their opponent from the very beginning and had the support of the entire crowd. Ismael Santos' excellent defense over Johnson, ►

José Miguel Antúnez's brilliant playmaking skills and Arlauckas' and Sabonis' excellent performance in offence proved too powerful for the Greeks to cope with. The victory made the crowd at the Príncipe Felipe Pavilion go wild.

The team was exhausted and incapable of winning the league title a third consecutive year, losing 3-2 to Barcelona in the playoff semifinals.

Sabonis bids farewell

After Winning the European Cup, Arvydas Sabonis announced his departure from the team in order to catch his last train to the best basketball league in the World: the NBA.

For different reasons, winning the European title prompted the farewell of men like Lasa, Cargol, Kurtinaitis and Chechu Biriukov. Antonio Martín retired due to problems on his back. Pablo Laso, Santi Abad, Mike Smith, Juanan Morales, Zoran Savic and Nikola Loncar were brought in to cover their absences. All in all, these seemed to be too many changes in order for the new to roster to bond well in just one year.

The winning character of the team, led by the great Arlauckas, took Obradovic's men through to the Euroleague's Final Four, where they unfortunately lost to Barcelona in the semifinals. The team had had a spectacular start (having a 15-point cushion over its opponent), but its mistakes proved fatal in the end.

Real Madrid were eliminated in the Copa del Rey semifinals and the ACB playoff quarterfinals by Caja San Fernando. They nevertheless had brilliant moments, such as Joe Arlauckas' memorable performance against Virtus Bologna in the Euroleague's Last 16, in which he scored 63 points.

The efforts the Club made to come up with a competitive team for the following season were amazing. Juan Antonio Orenga and Mikhail Mikhailov were signed to strengthen the team's game under the iron, while Alberto Angulo was hired as reinforcement outside the perimeter. The two star signings of the season were former Stefanel Milan point guard Dejan Bodiroga and, especially, Estudiantes small forward Alberto Herreros. The latter was the best Spanish player at the time, an infallible shooter who would change Real Madrid history during his nine years at the Club.

New challenges

Real Madrid had come up with a competitive and solvent team that wouldn't give up.

Finishing fifth in the previous season forced the Whites to play in the EuroCup (new name given to the Cup Winners' Cup), where they had no worthy rivals in the four rounds prior to the final in Nicosia, which was held on 15 April **1997**.

Their opponent for the clash was Iuzzolino's Verona, who hardly put up any resistance; it was one of the most peaceful European finals Real Madrid had ever been in. Herreros, Bodiroga and Arlauckas led the team to victory, but the team's triumph was of lesser importance than those that were to come that year. ►

The team lost in the Copa del Rey quarterfinals and could therefore only focus on winning the ACB League. Everyone thought Real Madrid had chances to win since they had dominated throughout the regular season.

Real Madrid defeated TDK Manresa and Estudiantes 3-0 in the quarterfinals and semis, respectively, without experiencing any problems. An unimpressive Barcelona up until that moment in the campaign waited for them in the finals. The Catalans surprised everyone with a very solid game and won the first clash 83-79. The Whites drew the second encounter 93-86, but the series was set to continue in Barcelona, where the eternal foe could snatch another victory without much trouble.

As expected, Barça won and the competition was therefore at stake for Real Madrid in the fourth clash. Thanks to an amazing Arlauckas, the Madridistas managed to force the tiebreak in the series.

The final returned to the Spanish capital, where fans were hoping their team would become the first club to win the title at home in the very last game of the series. Unfortunately, Roberto Dueñas pulled rank and gave Barcelona the title.

Djordjevic, Scariolo & League title at the Palau

The lack of titles in the **97/98** and **98/99** seasons forced the Director of the Basketball Section to make yet another coaching signing to put an end, once and for all, to the terrible run that was threatening the prestige of the most successful basketball team in Spanish and European history.

Sergio Scariolo, who had showcased his skills as coach at TAU Vitoria, was brought in to take the reins of the team. He made several changes on the squad that worked and allowed Real Madrid to be strong and ready to face the most crucial part of the league.

The **1999/2000** season saw the signings of former Barcelona Serb player Alexander Djordjevic and small forward Lucio Angulo, whose brother Alberto was already on the team.

Revenge for the madridistas

The Copa del Rey and the elimination in the Euroleague's Last 16 against Villeurbanne came too soon for a team that was still adapting to the changes that had recently been made. Scariolo patiently waited for his team's time to shine; that time came with the arrival of the ACB playoffs.

The Whites clashed with Canarias Telecom in the quarterfinal series and won 3-0. The semifinals between them and Estudiantes became one of the most exciting and tight series in ACB history, as both teams were in perfect form. The series was decided in the very last second of the fifth and final game when Djordjevic netted a free throw that put Real Madrid in the lead by one point with 30 seconds to go. Estudiantes had ball possession and the chance to win the encounter, but Chandler Thompson missed his final shot, throwing away his team's chances to make it to the final. ►

Barcelona and Real Madrid, the best two teams of the regular season, came face to face in the final series, which started in the northern city. Real Madrid surprised everyone by winning the first clash 72-64, but were defeated in the second game. Madrid destroyed the eternal foe in the third fixture by winning with a 26-point cushion, but Barça recovered and managed to win the fourth game.

It looked like the Catalans would win the title again, but Alexander Djordjevic predicted Real Madrid were going to win the fifth clash in Barcelona.

The game was tough and very tight. Despite Herreros' injury, the Madridistas remained calm and played intelligently. A nervous Barcelona was powerless against the amazing performances of centres Eric Struelens, Andrew Betts and Bren Scout, as well as that of shooters Alberto and Lucio Angulo and the excellent playmaking skills of point guard Djordjevic. Real Madrid therefore won the last Spanish league title of the 20th Century (their 28th) at the eternal foe's court, avenging the defeat they suffered there in **1997**.

Años 2000/10

New century, new president

Important changes took place at the Club with the coming of the new century. Florentino Pérez became the entity's President after defeating Lorenzo Sanz in the July **2000** election.

Pérez's first signing was Raül López, excellent point guard who was part of the 'golden generation' of young players who had won the gold medal in the Junior World Championship of Lisbon the previous year. He came from Joventut and was the star signing of a campaign that also saw the arrival of men like Marko Milic, Jiri Zidek and Eric Meek.

Real Madrid played at a very high level in every competition. Scariolo's boys reached the quarterfinals of the Euroleague, where Paf Bologna eliminated them in a spectacular series; the fans were extremely satisfied with the team's performance.

The Whites were favorites to win both Spanish championships (ACB and Copa del Rey) thanks to winning the title the previous year. However, a young player named Pau Gasol, who came from Barcelona's youth system and showcased an NBA quality game, led Barça to win both competitions.

Gasol's departure for the NBA and Real Madrid's signings of Zoran Tabak and Dragan Tarlac gave the Madridistas new hopes for the **2001/02** season, during which the Club turned 100.

Unfortunately, Raül López's injury against Forum Valladolid in November **2001** and those of Djordjevic, Herreros and the Angulo brothers (all important men on the roster) greatly affected the team throughout the campaign and thwarted its chances to win any titles.

Return of Lolo Sáinz

The club signed Spanish national coach Javier Imbroda, but the team didn't react as expected and the historic Lolo Sáinz was chosen by Florentino Perez ▶

to straighten the team's course and put it on the right path again. With him arrived coach Julio César Lamas and quality players Bennett, Bueno, Stojic, Fotsis and Kambala, all of whom made fans optimistic.

Despite failing to win any titles in the **2003/04** campaign, the team clearly played better and even managed to reach the ULEB Cup final, held in Charleroi (Belgium). They surprisingly lost against Hapoel Migdal 83-72, but at least nobody had doubts about the team's chances for the following year.

New League title

Real Madrid is a club that needs to win titles. It was precisely that need which forced more changes on the team. Bozidar Maljkovic came in as coach and Bullock, Hervelle, Sonko, Gelabale, Felipe Reyes and Justin Hamilton were signed as players.

The Serb coach's blend of experience and youth proved successful that year.

The team's performance in the Super Cup proved that the philosophy Maljkovic had instilled on the roster was the right one. The first games in the league showed the team had a competitive roster capable of winning titles.

Real Madrid's spectacular start to the ACB made them favorites to win the Copa del Rey in Zaragoza, but Garbajosa's Unicaja eventually defeated them 80-76 in a tight final.

A three-pointer for the ages

The team wanted revenge and could only aspire to win the league title the following season once they were eliminated from the Euroleague's Top 16.

Coming in second in the regular season behind TAU, who had reinforced themselves with Calderón, Scola, Macijauskas, Prigioni, Splitter and Vidal, Real Madrid defeated Joventut in the quarterfinal series and won 3-1 against Estudiantes in the semis.

TAU and Madrid came face to face in the final. The Basques were the clear favorites thanks to their dominance in the regular season and to having the home advantage.

The Whites weren't intimidated and pulled off a surprise victory in the first clash in Vitoria (84-82). Unfortunately, TAU pulled rank and won both the second game and the first clash in Madrid.

They failed to win the fourth game, but everything seemed they would take the title in the fifth encounter because of their home advantage.

Ivanovic's men played extremely well and came close to sentencing the clash several times. Despite always being behind on the scoreboard, Real Madrid never stopped believing in their chances and stood their ground. TAU continued to play according to plan until the 39-minute 20-second mark, when they were winning by eight points and the entire Buesa Arena crowd was singing the victory chant.

It was then that Real Madrid pulled off one of the most brilliant comebacks in basketball history. Thanks to the asphyxiating pressure at the pavilion and to the nerves TAU were experiencing, the Madridistas gradually cut distances short. Then, with six seconds to go and being two points behind in the scoreboard, Justin Hamilton passed the ball to Alberto Herreros, who had recently taken the court and was in a corner behind the 6.25 line. The team's captain shot as soon as he received the ball. It was an unbelievable three-pointer, an extraordinary shot that gave the team its 29th league title and provided Madridismo with one of its happiest moments.

Two legendary Madridistas joined the offices at the Club in the summer of 2005 to try to further boost the youth system. Antonio Martín became the Basketball Section's Director, while Alberto Herreros, now retired, became its Technical Director.

Igor Rakocevic, Marko Tomas and Venson Hamilton were the season's main signings, but the team didn't win any titles due to injuries and the new players' failure to adapt.

Real Madrid showcased their best game in the Euroleague, where they reached as far as the quarterfinals but were eliminated by Barcelona. The Whites reached the Copa del Rey semifinals and failed to reach further than the quarterfinals in the ACB, where they lost to Barcelona again.

A year to remember

The Club took measures to come up with a competitive team that would thrill the fans.

Maljkovic was dismissed and replaced by his second coach, Joan Plaza, who finally saw his dream of training a big team come true. His extraordinary skills as coach stood out from the start of **2006/07** season.

Executives and coaching staff came up with a balanced roster. Álex Mumbrú and Raül López returned, while Charles Smith and point guard Kerem Tunçeri were signed.

All the players worked together as a proper team. Felipe Reyes and Álex Mumbrú had recently won the World Championship in Japan with Spain (the greatest basketball achievement of the nation has ever had) and instilled the roster with a tremendous winning spirit.

The season was spectacular in every sense. Real Madrid had a surprisingly sensational start. Nobody thought a team with so many new players and a coach of no renown could play such straightforward and quality basketball.

Despite this, TAU finished first in the regular season and Barcelona defeated the team in the Copa del Rey final.

A cloud of uncertainty and doubt loomed over Real Madrid until it was blown away when they qualified to play in the ULEB Cup final after defeating Unics Kazan in the semis. Lietuvos Rytas were set to be their final opponent in the competition. ►

The clash took place in Charleroi on 10 April **2007**. The Whites were superior and always ahead on the scoreboard thanks to the prowess of Reyes, Smith, Mumburú, López and company. The Madridistas won their first Continental title in ten years by defeating their opponent 87-75.

This victory boosted the team's morale in the ACB. The players were optimistic and excited about giving the fans yet another title that year and fought hard in the playoffs.

It wasn't easy. They reached the final by defeating Pamesa 3-1 and Joventut 3-2 in the quarterfinals and semifinals, respectively. Once again, Barcelona waited for them in the finals.

Real Madrid pulled rank and gave their opponent no quarter, eventually winning their 30th league title in the fourth game, which took place in Barcelona. This victory was the icing on a brilliant year.

Far from winning every competition

Their spectacular run in the previous season established the Whites as the great favorites to win all the domestic championships. The Euroleague's Final Four was set to take place in Madrid and, despite clear dominance of late from teams like CSKA, Panathinaikos or Maccabi, fans and press alike hoped Real Madrid could qualify.

Their run in the previous stages of the league and the Euroleague was near perfect, losing very few games and playing great basketball. Real Madrid reached the latter competition's Top 16 thanks to qualifying second in their group, but they were pitted against powerful clubs like Olympiakos and Maccabi, who thwarted their chances of making it to the Final Four.

After defeating Marc Gasol's Akasvayu, the Madridistas lost to Rudy Fernández's and Ricky Rubio's Joventut in the semifinals of the Copa del Rey –this time held in Vitoria-. The Catalan team eventually went on to win the title.

Things were no better for them in the ACB. They lost to Unicaja in the quarterfinals.

The roster was rewarded in the **2008/09** campaign by its great performances and by becoming the best team in the regular season, which automatically gave them a ticket to play in the Euroleague the following year. This was the best result earned by Real Madrid in the season.

Joan Plaza's final season

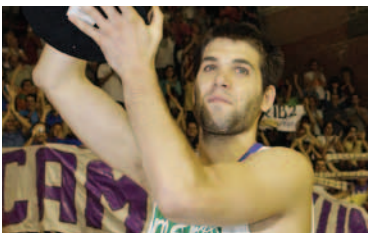
Real Madrid started the preseason in Andorra with few new faces on the team. The squad was reinforced for the new season with the signings of American shooting guard and former Pinar Karsikaya player Quinton Hosley, former Aris Salonika power forward Jeremiah Massey, and former Regal F.C. Barcelona point guard Juan Ignacio "Pepe" Sánchez. Marko Tomas returned to the team after being loaned out to Alta Gestión Fuenlabrada for one season.

These four players replaced Michalis Pelekanos, Kerem Tunçeri, Charles Smith, Blagota Sekulic and Íker Iturbe.

Academy players Nikola Mirotic, Miguel Molina and Jorge Santana made their first team debuts, while Juan Ignacio “Pepe” Sánchez and Quinton Hosley were dropped in mid-season and replaced by Belgian centre Tomas van den Spiegel and American small forward Kennedy Winston.

The first and only title the team won during the campaign was the 25th Basketball Tournament of Madrid; they lost to Alta Gestión Fuenlabrada 69-63 and defeated MMT Estudiantes 75-59. Real Madrid won thanks to their greater point average.

The ACB League started on 4 October **2008** with a game against Unicaja which Joan Plaza’s men lost 82-65.

The first third of the season wasn’t easy for the Whites because they lost more games than they had anticipated. They climbed back positions until they eventually reached the fifth spot on the table in mid-season thanks to 11 victories and 5 defeats.

The classification for the **2009** Copa del Rey ensured Real Madrid would face eternal foes Barcelona in the quarterfinals, but they lost to them 83-75.

Real Madrid had a brilliant run in the first round of the Euroleague, winning six and losing four of their Group D games. They came in second behind defending champions CSKA Moscow.

The Madridistas faced Regal F.C. Barcelona, Maccabi Electra and Alba Berlin in Group F of the Top 16, winning five games and losing just one, but the better basket average of the Catalans relegated Madrid to the second spot.

Olympiacos waited in the quarterfinals and won the knockout round 3-1.

Real Madrid were forced to focus solely on the ACB League. They finished fourth in the regular season with 23 victories and 9 defeats overall.

The Whites faced DKV in the playoffs quarterfinals and won 2-1.

TAU waited in the semis. Both sides fought hard, but the Northern team eventually won the series 2-1. Despite failing to win any titles, Real Madrid always showcased their talent and a relentless winning spirit.

Florentino Pérez’s starts second term

Florentino Pérez’s first project for the Basketball Section in his second term at the helm of Real Madrid started in July **2009** with the signing of Ettore Messina, one of the most prestigious basketball coaches in Europe, and the hiring of Antonio Maceiras as the Section’s Director.

The club then started to work on the signing of top tier players to shape the new project. Novica Velickovic, Jorge Garbajosa, Darjus Lavrinovic, Rimantas Kaukenas, Travis Hansen, Pablo Prigioni, Sergi Vidal and Vladimir Dasic all landed at Real Madrid.

The team's official debut took place in the 2009/10 Spanish Super Cup in Gran Canaria. The Whites defeated Caja Laboral 87-62 in the first semifinal and faced Barcelona in the final.

Real Madrid had the lead in the decisive clash during practically the entire clash, even earning a 10-point cushion at one point, but a late reaction from the Catalans brought the game to an agonic conclusion and they ended up winning 86-82.

After winning their 16th Madrid Tournament, the Whites started their run in the two most important championships of the year: the ACB League and the Euroleague.

Real Madrid had a spectacular start to the former with 11 straight victories and came in third in the regular season thanks to winning 27 encounters and losing only seven throughout the campaign. Ettore Messina's boys got rid of Cajasol in the playoffs' quarterfinal series (2-1) and lost to Caja Laboral in a very even semifinal series (3-2).

The Madridistas qualified for the Euroleague's Top 16 as Group D leaders and went on to reach the playoffs after a tough fight with Maccabi Tel Aviv, Efes Pilsen and Montepaschi Siena. Real Madrid faced Barcelona again in the quarterfinals and, despite winning a clash at the Palau Blaugrana, they eventually lost the series 3-1.

The Copa del Rey was held in Bilbao. The Madridistas defeated DKV Joventut 90-82 in the quarterfinals and Caja Laboral 78-50 in the semis, but failed to impose their style against Barcelona in the final and lost 80-61.

Return to the final four

With Juan Carlos Sanchez as new Director of the Basketball section, Real Madrid faced a new season filled with new challenges. They signed Carlos Suarez and Sergio Rodriguez to strengthen the club's bet on young national talent. They also added D'or Fischer and Clay Tucker to the roster to strengthen the team's game in the zone and outside the three-point line. The Slovenian international Mirza Begic joined them in January 2011.

Real Madrid came in second in the regular season of the ACB League with 26 victories and eight defeats, standing undefeated in the 17 fixtures they played at the Caja Magica.

The Madridistas faced Fuenlabrada in the playoffs quarterfinals, winning the series 2-0. They were then eliminated by Bizkaia Bilbao Basket 3-1 in the semifinal series.

Real reached the Copa del Rey final after winning against Gran Canaria 2014 and Power Electronics Valencia, respectively. They nevertheless lost 68-60 against Barcelona in the last stage.

But the best was yet to come: Real Madrid had their best season in the Euroleague, reaching the Barcelona Final Four for the first time in 15 years.

They qualified for the Top 16 as the runners-up of Group B, facing Montepaschi, Efes Pilsen and Partizan in the second round. They qualified for the playoffs as group leaders for the first time since the creation of the Euroleague format in the 2000/01 season.

Despite this, the 95-77 defeat against Montepaschi Siena in the last game of the Top 16 resulted in Ettore Messina's resignation. The coach was then replaced by assistant coach Emanuele Molin.

The Whites nevertheless gave their all and defeated a combative Power Electronics Valencia in the playoffs quarterfinals 3-2.

Molin's team lost 82-63 to Maccabi Electra in the semifinals of the Final Four, and 80-62 to Montepaschi Siena in the third place playoff.

What is the Association of Real Madrid Basketball Players?

The Real Madrid Basketball Players Association is a non-profit organisation officially founded in 1996. There are two requisites for being a member: they must be retired and must have been on Real Madrid's first team roster for at least one season. Confirmed members reserve the right to also accept former academy players who, if inducted, may express their opinions in assemblies, but will not have the right to vote.

The statutes of the Association establish that elections to the Board must be held every four years. The General Extraordinary Assembly of 2008 saw Rafael Rullán become take over as President from Juan Antonio Corbalán. The Board comprises Vice Presidents Luis María Prada and José Manuel Beirán; Treasurer and Secretary Vicente Paniagua; and Fernando Romay, Antonio Llorente, Francisco Capel and Darío Quesada.

The initial goal of the Association (which already has 60 members) was to avoid former teammates and colleagues from losing contact through the years. It therefore determined the best way of getting them all together was to have them play basketball again. After many years filled with joy, trips and dreams, the Association took its first steps by organising non-professional games for its members to spread Real Madrid's name across Spain and Europe, just as they did when they were still active.

The Association has grown and incorporated other activities through the years. One of its first projects was to create a school, which led to annual summer camps in which kids take master classes that instil in them a fervent passion for basketball. This initiative allows the Association to have a young and enthusiastic spirit, and helps it spread its view of basketball as a way of life.

A Real Madrid player knows what it is to fight, to work hard, to share and to be charitable. That's why the Association has always looked after its players, helping those in dire straits or in need of assistance, like in the old days. This is the stepping-stone of its social work.

Social Work

Thanks to the support the Association receives from Real Madrid CF, and thanks to its sponsors and the games it plays throughout the year, it has been able to have the necessary resources to tackle several social activities during the last 15 years, such as participating regularly in charitable games and making donations in areas affected by natural catastrophes: oil spills, floods, tsunamis, earthquakes, etc.

The Association has also worked with prison inmates through a basketball social and sports programme based on periodic exhibitions in prison centres.

The Association has also been involved in initiatives that serve to promote basketball in unprivileged areas.

Last but not least, the Association has created two types of grants, hoping to support club players and make academy players aware of the importance of studying and of having appropriate academic studies:

- Emiliano Rodríguez Grant: this is an annual grant awarded to the youth teamer with the best academic record at the end of the academic year.
- Mirza Delibasic Grant: supplies financial support to Real Madrid players that need it.

Real Madrid Legends Basketball Camp

Every summer, the Association of Real Madrid Basketball Players organises the Real Madrid Legends Basketball Camp, which is aimed at boys and girls aged between 8 and 16 years. It takes place in July in the facilities of Ciudad Deportiva Municipal San Javier (Murcia).

Historic Real Madrid personalities are present during the camp. They put their experience and knowledge of basketball to the service of youngsters who, in ten days, learn about technique and have fun practicing the sport while learning essential sports and social values. Training sessions are designed according to age and playing level, and are enhanced by technique polishing groups and several fun competitions. Participants also have time off to enjoy themselves in the swimming pool or to practice other sports.

The incredible facilities at Polideportivo Municipal de San Javier have all sorts of surfaces to practice all sorts of activities: an indoor pavilion with three lateral courts, 2 minibasket courts, 2 swimming pools –one outdoor and one indoor-, paddle tennis and regular tennis courts, a football pitch, a football 7 pitch, a gym, green and leisure areas, and an auditorium for film screenings and other activities.

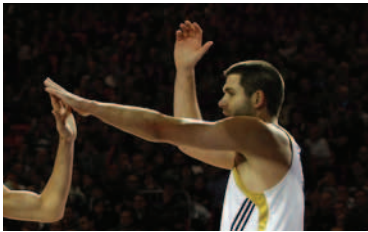

Ante Tomic is one of the greater talents to come out of the prestigious Croatian basketball youth circuit.

Bred in the academy of home town team Dubrovnik, the centre signed for KK Zagreb as an Under-18 player and made his professional debut with the team in the Croatian League during the 2004/05 season.

Tomic soon played for the Under-16, Under-18 and Under-20 sides of the Croatian national team and was able to make his debut with the main side thanks to his excellent progress at KK Zagreb, with whom he won the 2008 Cup of Croatia. Ante won the Gold Medal with Croatia in the XVI Mediterranean Games, held in Pescara in 2009.

The centre remained at KK Zagreb for the start of the 2009/10 campaign and averaged 17.9 points and 8.9 rebounds per clash in his 15 Adriatic League games. In six Eurochallenge fixtures, Tomic scored 17.5 points and pulled down 8.2 rebounds per game. These impressive figures caught the attention of Real Madrid, who are always interested in signing the best players in the world.

The Croatian player arrived in Madrid in February 2010 to strengthen the Whites' game under the iron and soon made incredible progress in the ACB League and the Euroleague.

Tomic soon became a leading player on the roster and proved the Club's decision to sign him had been an excellent one.

The centre consolidated himself as a sure bet for Real Madrid during the 2010/11 season. He earned Best Centre honours in the ACB League and made the competition's Ideal Five for netting 10 points, grabbing 4.3 rebounds and earning a 10.9 PIR on average per game, as well as for his extraordinary technique and fantasy game in the paint. Tomic proved decisive in Real Madrid's road to the Euroleague's Final Four, scoring 9.9 points, pulling down 5.3 rebounds and earning a 10.7 PIR per clash. The Croatian player proved to be one of the best centres in Europe.

His youth, potential and drive to better himself will surely allow Tomic to be one of the leading players on a roster that's ready to compete at the highest level one more year.

Profile

Rudy Fernández learned to play basketball in the academy of DKV Joventut and soon became one of the greatest talents in Spanish basketball. He made his first team debut in the ACB League on 7 April 2002 against Real Madrid, but he didn't fully integrate on the roster until the 2003/04 season, during which he played 34 games, scoring 11.1 points, grabbing 3.9 rebounds and serving 2.3 assist on average per game.

Rudy's rise to prominence happened during the 2004 Copa del Rey held in Seville. Despite losing the final to TAU Cerámica, the player from Mallorca was chosen as the tournament's MVP. It was the turning point from which he started becoming successful both with his club and the Spanish national team.

He made his international debut with Spain in the 2004 Olympic Games of Athens and was part of the roster that won the Gold Medal in the 2006 World Championship and the Silver in the 2007 EuroBasket.

He won the FIBA EuroCup 2006 with DKV Joventut and, during the 2007/08 campaign (which proved to be his final season at the club) took the ULEB Cup and Copa del Rey titles.

After winning the Silver Medal in the 2008 Beijing Olympics with Spain the small forward packed his bags and left for the US, where he played for NBA side Portland Trail Blazers.

During his three years on the Oregon team, Rudy Fernández banked 9.1 points, pulled down 2.5 rebounds and gave 2.2 assists on average per clash, becoming one of Nate McMillan's team's key players outside the perimeter. His achievements in the best basketball league of the world included netting more three-pointers

than any previous rookie, and participating both in the All-Rookie game and the 2008/09 All-Star dunk contest.

Rudy Fernández returned to Europe in the summer of 2011 to play for Real Madrid. The club worked ceaselessly to sign him and complete their shooter roster, with which they hope to thrill fans in a thrilling season.

Martynas Pocius learned to play basketball away from Lithuania, at Holderness High School in New Hampshire. He then attended Duke University, which has great basketball tradition, but many injuries prevented him from shining in a team that boasted many star players.

After finishing university, the small forward returned to Lithuania in 2009 and signed for Zalgiris Kaunas, with whom he won the Baltic League in the 2009/10 season having fully recovered from his injury. Zalgiris reached the Euroleague's Top 16 that season. Pocius shone in the latter championship, scoring 8.1 points and grabbing 2 rebounds per clash.

Pocius sealed a great year by winning the Bronze Medal in the 2010 Turkey World Championships with Lithuania. His 9.6 points, 2.6 rebounds and 1.6 assists per clash made him a key player on a team that put the Baltic country back in the basketball elite.

During his second year at Kaunas' most important team Pocius became even more prominent and decisively helped his side win the Baltic and Lithuanian leagues in the 2010/11 season.

Zalgiris again reached the Top 16 in the Euroleague, where he averaged 10.9 points and 2.7 rebounds per clash, improving his figures from the previous campaign.

Pocius is very strong and handles the ball with skill. He penetrates the game under the iron and is a solid shot. All this makes him an effective shooter against whom it's hard to defend. His signing for Real Madrid is intended to strengthen the team's already powerful game outside the three-point line in order to help it fight to win every title at stake.

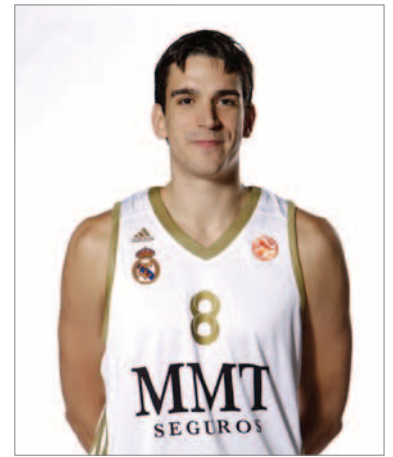

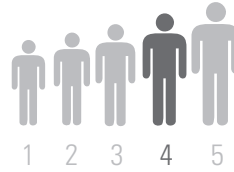

Reyes is a centre belonging to the 'Golden Junior' generation of Spanish basketball players who won the Under-20 European Championship in 1999. Felipe made his debut in the ACB League during the 1998/99 season with Estudiantes.

Nikola Mirotic started playing in the academy of KK Joker, in his native Podgorica. Real Madrid scouts heard of reports and files on the talented under-16 player and travelled to the city to see him in action.

Mirotic convinced the coaching staff of Real Madrid's academy and they signed him for the Under-20 side. He then won the Under-20 ACB Circuit and made great progress in his first two years at the club, eventually making it to the Real Madrid Liga Adecco LEB Bronze side that played in the 2008/09 season. He made his first professional appearance in the LEB Bronze league, and his ACB League and Euroleague debuts that same year thanks to his excellent performances with the second team.

In order to complete his formation, the Montenegro power forward was loaned to Palencia Baloncesto in the Adecco LEB Oro league for the 2009/10 campaign. Averaging 8 points, 4.6 rebounds and a PIR of 8.4 per clash, Mirotic helped the team avoid relegation.

Profile

Pablo Laso deservedly became a legendary ACB player; no one has served more assists or made as many steals in the competition's 29 year history. Laso was a point guard with excellent vision of the game who had a 19 year career at teams such as Taogrés Vitoria, Real Madrid, Caceres Club Baloncesto, Lineltex Trieste, Unicaja Málaga, C.B. Girona, Caparabo Lleida and C.B Valladolid.

Laso won the Under-22 World Championships in 1989 with Spain in Andorra and was capped 61 times. He won the Copa del Rey title with Taogrés in the 1994/95 season and the Copa Saporta in the 1996/97 campaign with Real Madrid.

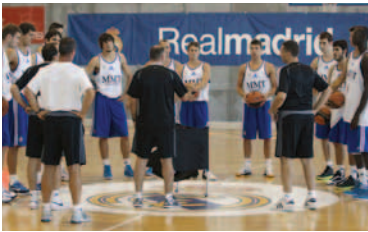
Always passionate about basketball, he decided to become a coach upon retiring in 2003. He completed his formation at LEB-2 side Pamesa Castellón and made his coaching debut in the ACB League with its first team, Pamesa Valencia, in the 2004/05 season, helping them reach the Copa del Rey and ULEB Cup semifinals.

During his first year on the team, Laso managed to win the league title, which got it promoted to the ACB League. In the last three campaigns, the coach headed a project that consolidated Bruesa as a solid ACB team and San Sebastian as an important city in Spanish basketball.

Laso's excellent job in San Sebastian, his vast knowledge of the sport and his experience as a former Real Madrid player make him the ideal man to be at the helm of a team that aspires to consolidate itself as one of the best sides in Europe during the 2011/12 season.

Palacio de los Deportes de la CAM

The Palacio de los Deportes is one of the most charismatic sports venues in Madrid. Located in the Salamanca district of the city, the Palacio de los Deportes de la Comunidad Autónoma de Madrid (CAM) is located where the Goya bullring stood between 1874 and 1934, when it was demolished due to the construction of Las Ventas bullring.

Municipal authorities didn't decide to build on the abandoned and near-forgotten plot - located in one of the best areas in the city - until the mid-1950s. Following serious deliberation, the authorities of the Spanish capital decided to build a large sports pavilion with capacity to hold between 10,000 and 16,000 people.

The Palacio de los Deportes finally saw the light of day in 1960 and, from then on, housed first rate sports events such as the Judo European Championship of 1965, the 1985 Karate World Championship or the final of the Handball European Championship in 1985, amongst many others.

The venue has been linked to basketball ever since it housed the final of the 1960 Copa del Generalísimo, in which Real Madrid defeated C.D. Hesperia 76 – 64. Fans of the sport also remember the 1986 World Championship final that was held at the venue.

Real Madrid decided to capitalise on the wave of popularity the sport enjoyed in those years to reach an agreement with the Autonomous Government of Madrid (who owns the venue) to play there in 1985. The pavilion was remodeled for the World Championship and could hold a crowd 12,500 strong. Real Madrid played there until 1998 and, during those twelve seasons, won two league titles, two Copa del Rey trophies, one Euroleague title and a Copa Saporta.

The team stopped playing at the Palacio in 1998 to return to the Raimundo Saporta pavilion, but they briefly played at the Polideportivo Municipal Parque Corredor in Torrejón de Ardoz as they waited for the former venue's remodeling to finish in February 1999.

In 2001, the Palacio de los Deportes was practically destroyed by a fire provoked by the sparks of a torch gun used in the roof's waterproofing works.

Fortunately, and to the delight of all sports fans, the venue was rebuilt. Since its reopening on 16 February 2006, the Palacio has housed numerous sports events and shows of all kinds.

The pavilion has maintained its strong relationship with basketball in this new era, also becoming the chosen venue to house the 2009 and 2011 editions of the Copa del Rey, the 2008 Euroleague Final Four, and the 2007 EuroBasket, in which Spain won the Silver Medal.

Our courts

There have been several courts where Real Madrid has forged its legend since the Basketball Section was established in 1931. The **Palacio de los Deportes** is the current home of a team that, back in the 1930s, played on ash or sand courts that were even sometimes wet. The balls they used (which had a shape and weight hard to envision nowadays) bounced irregularly on floors delineated only by the first rows of fans that piled up on the lime dust edges. They didn't care about not having a roof over their heads to protect them from the harshness of the weather.

Frontón Fiesta Alegre became Real Madrid's first permanent home, a place where they won their first national and European titles that currently adorn the trophy shelves at the Club. After writing several glorious pages in the annals of history, Real Madrid packed their bags and moved to the pavilion at the old Real Madrid City in 1965. During the construction works, the team played as locals at the court at Maravillas School for several months.

Despite training at **Real Madrid City's Basketball Pavilion** for several days, the venue wasn't officially inaugurated until 6 January 1966 with the celebration of the I Intercontinental Cup-Philips Trophy (which later came to be known as the Christmas Trophy). Ignis Varese, Jamaco Saint Chicago and Corinthians were the team's first opponents in its new home.

Twenty years and several triumphs later, in 1986 Real Madrid decided to move to Madrid's **Palacio de los Deportes** due to the rise in popularity of basketball in the country and the growing number of Real Madrid basketball fans. The new venue was much larger, with capacity for 12,500 fans. The Whites left it in October 1998 and started playing at the **Parque Corredor de Torrejón de Ardoz Municipal Sports Centre** provisionally while the old Pavilion at Real Madrid City was being renewed.

Once finished, it was renamed **Raimundo Saporta Pavilion** in memory of the great Real Madrid Board Member who died in February 1997. It was a very modern and practical venue with 5,000 seats, but the team was forced to move again soon after when the plot where old Real Madrid City stood was sold.

Vistalegre Arena was the team's home between 2004 and 2009. Located in Carabanchel, it was constantly flooded by tides of Madridistas who regained the excitement for a sport that has brought much joy to the Club throughout its history. Vistalegre became one of the most charismatic courts in Europe and the venue where Real Madrid won the 2004/05 and 2006/07 ACB League titles, as well as the 2006/07 ULEB Cup.

For the 2010/11 campaign, the team moved to the **Caja Mágica**, a modern and functional venue located in the Parque del Manzanares. At the court, Real Madrid were the strongest local side in the regular season of the ACB League and also in the Euroleague. ►



The club returns to the **Palacio de los Deportes** this season. Madridistas have very fond memories of the pavilion. The fire it suffered from in 2001 forced it to be completely rebuilt. Since reopening in 2005, the Palacio has housed several important sports events, such as the 2009 and 2011 Copa del Rey editions, and the 2007 EuroBasket. The 2011/12 Real Madrid side will try to relive the accomplishments the club earned there between 1986 and 1998 with the everlasting support of their fans.

Practice sessions

Real Madrid will allow access to practice sessions to media accredited by the ACB and the club. Generally, this access will be granted during the first 10-15 minutes of each session, but they should contact the club's Communications Department for confirmation.

Games

After the game, the visiting coach will give a press conference that will be followed by one given by the local coach.

Members of the media who were accredited to access the dressing rooms at least 24 hours before the game may interview the players after the game is over. Journalists will be allowed inside, but not photographers.

Television channels with rights to the game may record images as long as they show the players from the waist up. The dressing room will be open to the media for approximately 15 minutes.

Official media covering the visiting team that have solicited access with approval of the Director of Communications of the visiting team may access their dressing room and, room providing, the local dressing room.

A press conference of the visiting team's coach will take place at least within 15 minutes after the conclusion of the game. The local coach will address the media after his colleague.

Accreditations

Request and collection of accreditations for games

Media platforms lacking accreditation for the season must request credentials for the game they wish to cover.

To get said credentials, members of the media must contact Real Madrid Basketball's Communications Department by e-mail at prensa@realmadrid.es. Full names, ID Card numbers and job descriptions (i.e. reporter, photographer, camera operator, commentator, etc) of each person to be accredited must be specified.

Requests should be made at least 48 hours before the game, except for weekend games. The deadline for the latter will be 12 noon CET the Friday prior to the encounter.

Real Madrid will try to satisfy all requests according to available space in the area reserved for the media at the Palacio de los Deportes, but cannot guarantee the processing of every request form.

Accreditations will be handed out the day of the game at the media entrance of the Palacio de los Deportes located on Calle Lombía. This entrance will open two hours prior to tip-off. It will be compulsory to show ID cards and accreditations at the entrance.

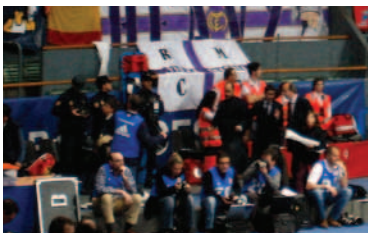
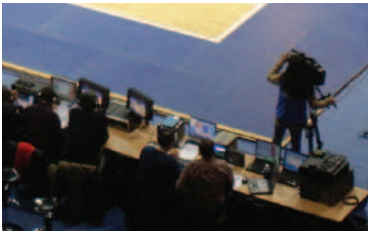

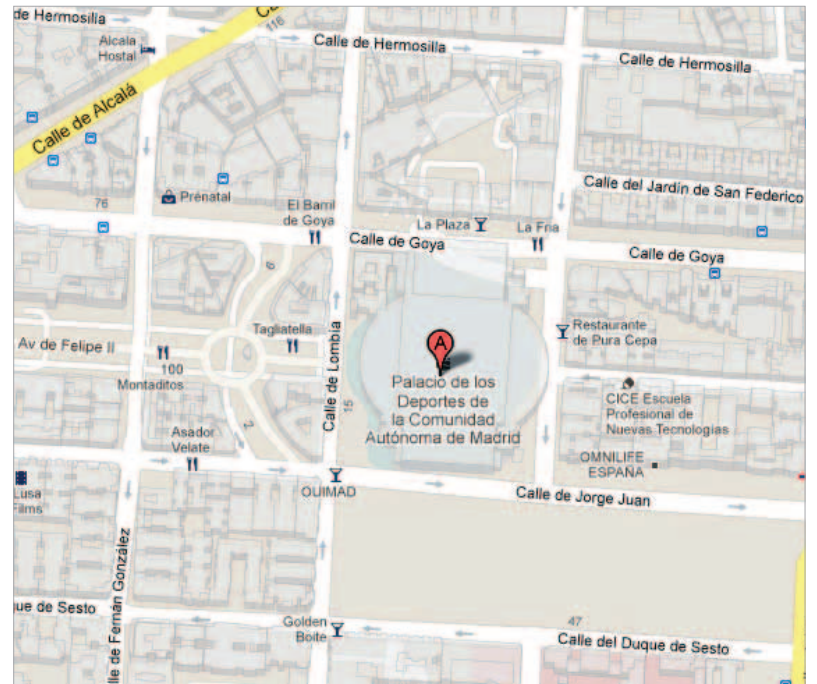

Information about Madrid

Location

The City of Madrid is just a few kilometres north of the **Iberian Peninsula's** geographic centre, located in the **Los Ángeles Hills**. Madrid holds the largest population in Spain (**3,200,000**) and its metropolitan areas have more than 5 million inhabitants altogether.

Climate

Madrid has a **Continental-Mediterranean** climate. **Summers** are very warm, with temperatures sometimes reaching **40° C** or higher. **Winters** are cold, with an average of **6° C**—temperatures rarely reach below **0°**-. The city's climate is also dry. **Rainfall** isn't frequent—**500 mm** per year- and usually takes place in **autumn** and **spring**.

Tourism

Madrid is a **modern and dynamic city**. Its services, culture and leisure activities make it one of the most important cities in Europe. It is the most visited city in Spain, receiving 9 million tourists each year. The town has a lot to offer, from monuments like the Puerta de Alcalá, the Royal Palace and Cibeles Fountain, to emblematic places like the Puerta del Sol, Retiro Park and the Plaza Mayor.

Madrid is also the home of three of the most important museums in the world: the Prado, the Thyssen-Bornemisza and the Reina Sofía.

Transportation

Flights

Madrid-Barajas Airport is only 12 kilometres north of the city centre, making it one of the European airports closest to an urban centre. More than 50 million passengers arrive there every year, making it the fourth most-frequented airport in Europe. It is the leading Spanish airport in operations (470,000 every year) and in weight carrying (328,985,331 kg in 2008).

Madrid-Barajas is a functional and modern airport with four terminal buildings that connect it with practically every other airport in Spain and Europe. It has more connections with Latin America than any other European airport.

The opening of its Terminal 4 building in February 2006 greatly contributed to its growth in recent years.

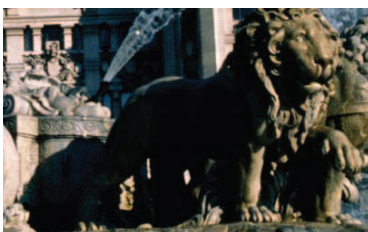
Madrid-Barajas is linked to the city via underground (line 8) and several regular bus lines. Every terminal has a taxi stop.

Underground (Metro)

The metro is no doubt the best means of transportation to move around the city. Its 309 kilometres, 12 conventional lines, a special line, three outdoor lines and 319 stops make it the sixth largest underground network in the world.

Besides covering the city centre, Metro reaches out to an incredible number of suburbs and towns outside the city, like Móstoles, Alcorcón, Leganés, Fuenlabrada, Getafe, Pozuelo de Alarcón and Boadilla del Monte.

Car

Madrid is the starting point for the entire **Spanish National Road Network**. The country has six principle roads that start at the Puerta del Sol. The rest of the roads in Spain stem from these.

The **N-I** or Carretera de Burgos connects Madrid with the north of Spain (Santander, Bilbao...), the **N-II** or Carretera de Barcelona links the capital with the northeast (Barcelona, Gerona...), the **N-III** or Carretera de Valencia connects the city with the east, the **N-IV** or Carretera de Andalucía joins it to the south, the **N-V** or Carretera de Extremadura connects Madrid to the southeast (Mérida, Badajoz...), and the **N-VI** or Carretera de La Coruña connects it with the northeast (Galicia).

Ever since the General Road Plan was created in 1939, 41 of these roads have kept their names despite having been reshaped, redirected, enlarged or upgraded to highways.

Madrid has four bypass highways (**M-30, M-40, M-45, M-50**) that structure the traffic in the city and guarantee that the city centre is well connected to the suburbs and outskirt towns. Madrid also has four radial roads (**R-2, R-3, R-4, R-5**).

Train

A good way to travel to the metropolitan areas from the city and back would be by using the **RENFE Cercanías** system. It covers 370 km of the entire province and even reaches to neighbouring provinces like Guadalajara, Toledo and Segovia. It currently has eight lines and most of them are connected at some point with the Metro.

Trains are also a good option to move around the city. The opening of the new station at Puerta del Sol in June 2009 has taken the RENFE Cercanías system to the heart of the Spanish capital. People living in the city centre have greatly benefited from this.
